

1.Context	1. Where the word is found; within a specific sentence within a specific text.
2. Meaning	2. The definition of a word in a specific setting
3. Form	3. The building blocks of the word, including prefixes, affixes and suffixes
4. Use	4. How the word is 'stretched' and manipulated to fit its particular context
5. Collocation	5. Word combinations ; the way in which words co-exist and, through time and custom, seem normal and acceptable
6. Phonemes	6. The individual sounds found within the word.
7. Word stress	7. The phonemes in the word that are 'punched' more than the others.
8. Lexical chunk/phrase	8. Groups of words which, together, hold specific meaning.
9. Antonyms	9. Pairs of words which hold the opposite meaning.
10. Synonyms	10. Words which mean the same thing and which can be interchanged.
11. Near-synonyms	11. Words which hold similar meanings but which are not identical.
12. High frequency words	12. Words which are used a lot and are common. Often these words are the 'classification' or 'super ordinate' word.
